


Who is involved?

- Administer processes with strong public engagement
- Similar capacity challenges and operational realities
- Participation at forums includes a focus on senior level operational staff and board members

What's been done?

- Three (3) in-person forums have been held so far:
 - January, 2016 Yellowknife, Northwest Territories
 - October, 2017 Whitehorse, Yukon
 - September 2017 Cambridge Bay, Nunavut







What was the focus?

- Prior to each workshop, the forum facilitator engaged with the group remotely
 - teleconferences, questionnaires, and surveys
 - to develop the agenda, interest in possible topics was gauged
- Participants prepared overview presentations on selected topics, focusing on specific themes or issues
 - e.g. each Board presented a best practice and a discussion of how it had helped the Board



What was the focus?

- Some of the key expectations of forum participants included:
 - acquire new ideas on best practices from other Boards that have the same basic processes
 - begin to dismantle barriers to effective participation in Board processes
 - strengthen connections and encourage more dialogue amongst Boards
 - find out what other Boards are doing to improve their processes or operations
 - gain support from working together instead of working in silos
 - acknowledge the distinct processes and similar objectives of each Board
 - ensure that we learn from the past while building the future
 - see what's going on around us instead of only focusing on our own issues


- Guidance on submission requirements

- process map of regulatory approval processes





Focus on deepening participant expectations regarding:

- Networking & collaborative learning
- Engaging unique perspectives
- Supporting each other
- Improving regional co-management coordination
- Better understanding roles & responsibilities of other stakeholders, such as Crown's consultation obligations.

- More recent priority topics included:
 - Linkages between Impact Assessment and Licensing
 - Adaptive management strategies
 - Coordination between the EIA review and regulatory phases
 - Orphaned terms & conditions
 - Engagement and Consultation
 - Logistical challenges visiting remote communities
 - Capacity challenges, organizational stability



What comes next?

- Increasing frequency of communication
- Joint guidelines and/or policy development
- Joint training program development
- Information sharing technology
- Temporary learning assignments/staff exchanges
- Demonstrating transboundary preparedness
- Post-project sharing
- Other knowledge sharing



What comes next?



- Forum Terms of Reference
- Sharepoint site under development to allow easier sharing of resources
- Formal coordination agreements under development, MOUs
- Sharing our experiences with broader audiences
- Fourth forum planned for Fall, 2018 in Yellowknife
